First of all I want to both thank you and challenge you.

Let me share the good news first. A member of our church, who wishes to remain anonymous, paid off the remaining mortgage on the church building's newest edition. This was done in memory of Marilyn Aldinger.

I want to thank all of you for your faithfulness in paying off the mortgage. That's the good news.

The bad news—and this is where the challenge for all of us is—so far this year we have paid only 24% of our apportionments.

Our apportionments are needed for many reasons. Yes, they do pay the salaries of our Wisconsin Conference staff but they also make it possible for our ministries and missions to take place all around the world, for people who are in desperate need.

Let me give you just one of many examples of global ministry that is made possible through our apportionments.

The World Service Fund is the essential core of our global outreach ministry, underwriting Christian mission around the world. By giving to World Service we empower United Methodist evangelistic efforts...stimulate Bible study and spiritual commitment...encourage church growth and discipleship...and help God's children everywhere.

In Wisconsin our apportionments support part of the cost to operate the two Wisconsin UM camp and retreat centers, as well as provide support for health and welfare agencies like Northcott Neighborhood House, UM Children Services, Harbor House, the Madison Chaplaincy Program and Hmong House of Good News.

In turn, our Wisconsin Annual Conference is able to meet the commitment of the apportionments that are sent on to our General

Conference who administers the money needed to support ministries and missions around the world.

A few years ago, I read an article concerned with the effects of not paying the apportionments. Our United Methodist Denomination, because of a lack of funding (apportionment totals not being met), had to lay off hundreds of people throughout the denomination. We all know someone, or remember for ourselves, what it feels like to lose a job.

As a United Methodist Congregation, we are part of a connectional system. What is

impossible for one congregation to do in the area of ministry and mission, all the congregations of our denomination can accomplish together if our apportionment commitments are met.

I am challenging all of us to pray about what we need to do to give a little extra so that we can meet our responsibilities to our brothers and sisters in the world and in our own denomination.

I pray daily, that God will give us generous hearts and the ways and means to support all the ministries and missions of our denomination.

Considering the great need, I want to leave you with one last thought. We live in, if not the richest nation, one of the richest in the world. God has given this world all that is needed for abundant life. By comparison to the rest of the world, we in America are very rich—richer than we think.

We really do **not** live in a world of scarcity. We live in a world of abundance! We need to remind ourselves each day of that fact. God is good to us all the time; in Jesus name. Amen.




