The theologian Karl Barth believed that a good preacher and pastor should have the Bible in one hand and the daily newspaper in the other.

Over the last few years, the news media keeps reporting more bad news than good news. As a result, people are frightened of a great many things. One of the greatest fears has to do with the future. Will there be a future for us, our children and grandchildren, etc.?

I shared this story before but in light of everything that is going on in our world today, I think it's appropriate to repeat the story.

The story is of an ancient philosopher who had been dead for many centuries. He was told that his teachings were being misrepresented by his disciples. Being a compassionate and truth-loving individual, he managed, after much effort, to get the grace to come back to earth for a few days.

It took him several days to convince his successors of his identity. Once that was established, they were no longer interested in what he had to say. Instead they kept asking him the secret of coming back to life from the grave.

It was only after considerable discussion with them that the philosopher finally convinced them that there was no way he could impart this secret to them, and told them that it was extremely important for the good of humanity that they restore his teaching to its original purity.

He was told that would be a futile task. They told him, "What is important is not what you taught but our interpretation of what you taught."

All major religions around the world have as their base teaching our need to receive and

give love and care. Each day as I read the newspaper, listen to the news on television and sometimes the radio, I wonder what Jesus would say to us if he were to come back to us today in physical form. I also wonder if Jesus did come back today, how we would react to him.

We have religious extremists all over the world but especially in the Middle-east who, in the name of their particular brand of religion, believe it is right and their duty to kill people who believe something other than they do. The rigidity of some people in their beliefs is alarming to me.

In every religion, including Christianity, the world has suffered from fanatics. The only way we as Christ's disciples, can help to change the world, is to live a true Christian faith based upon God's love for us, exemplified by Jesus the Christ.

If Jesus came back in physical form today, I believe he would first scold us for failing to live his teachings. Second, Jesus would probably tell us that we are to accept and love everyone regardless of who they are, where they come from, what they look like and what they believe.

In his book, *Taking Flight*, Anthony de Mello wrote, "It is not the diversity of our dogmas but our dogmatism that does the damage. Thus, if each of us did what we are firmly persuaded is the will of God the result would be utter chaos. Certainty is the culprit. The spiritual person knows uncertainty—a state of mind unknown to the religious fanatic."

What might Jesus say to you if he came to you today? Would you recognize him? He may come to you in several different people including a homeless person.



This year, the Wisconsin Conference UMC has committed to raise \$1 million to support Imagine No Malaria by Annual Conference 2015. Bishop Jung is challenging all churches and all people in Wisconsin Conference to get involved with Imagine No Malaria in some way throughout the next year – through prayers, advocacy, and fundraising.

**Our Church has been challenged to raise \$2,000** in support of the INM campaign and Lynn Curtis will be spearheading our efforts. The Nurture Team has designated Noisy Cans for the months of December 2014 thru May 2015 to go towards INM. Other events and informational moments will also be done throughout the coming months.



Malaria is a disease of poverty, accounting for over 200 million cases every year and killing one person every minute. The disease continues to affect an entire continent, as the African people and economy are burdened by this preventable and treatable disease. For nearly two centuries, the people of The United Methodist Church have been engaged in partnership with our brothers and sisters in Africa – serving with the poor and creating solutions to these systemic problems.

In 2006, The United Nations Foundation partnered with The United Methodist Church in the Nothing But Nets campaign, raising more than \$7 million to provide insecticide-treated bed nets to the people of Africa. In 2008, building on the success of Nothing But Nets, a new, comprehensive program to fight malaria was created. This initiative, called Imagine No Malaria, is the extraordinary effort of The United Methodist Church to raise \$75 million by 2015 to end deaths and suffering from malaria in Sub-Saharan Africa. This is Faith in Action at its finest, and the people of The United Methodist Church around the world have responded to the call.



To date, over \$62 million has been raised toward our denominational goal - \$40 million of which was raised in just the last year and a half alone. Through the efforts of the United Methodist Church along with our partners at the United Nations Foundation, the Global Fund, and the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, we have successfully cut the death rate from malaria in half in just the last eight years. Contributions to this life-saving campaign not only fund the distribution of insecticide-treated bed nets but also sustain the efforts of our network of health clinics, hospitals, and churches in Africa committed to creating a world where no one dies from this preventable disease.

Our Goal: Raise \$1 Million in Wisconsin We have a big goal ahead of us, but we serve a God who can do "immeasurably more than we can ask or imagine" (Ephesians 3:20). Let that truth be an invitation to all of us as we embark on this incredible journey together. We have the chance to save thousands of lives, and we can't wait to see the amazing things God will do through the people of the Wisconsin Conference this year.





**Book:** Chris Anding's choice this month is "Up—A Mother and Daughter's Peakbagging Adventure" by Patricia Ellis Herr. It's a fascinating book about a mother who lets her daughter have the freedom to hike that some of us can only dream about. When Trish Herr became pregnant with her first daughter, Alex, she and her husband, Hugh, vowed to instill a bond with nature in their children. mountains. In *Up*, Trish recounts their always exhilarating--and sometimes harrowing--adventures climbing all forty-eight of New Hampshire's highest mountains. Readers will delight in the expansive views and fresh air that only peakbaggers are afforded, and will laugh out loud as Trish urges herself to "mother up" when she and Alex meet an ornery--and alarmingly bold--spruce grouse on the trail. This is, at heart, a resonant, emotionally honest account of a mother's determination to foster independence and fearlessness in her daughter, to teach her "that small doesn't necessarily mean weak; that girls can be strong; and that big, bold things are possible."
