

What is a disciple of Jesus Christ?



Jesus came and told his disciples, "I have been given all authority in heaven and on earth. ¹⁹ Therefore, go and make **disciples** of all the nations baptizing them in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit. 20 Teach these new disciples to obey all the commands I have given you..." Matthew 28:18-20

"The word disciple refers to a student or apprentice. Disciples in Jesus's day would follow their rabbi (which means teacher) wherever he went, learning from the rabbi's teaching and being trained so they could become rabbis themselves. Basically, a disciple is a follower, but only if we take the term *follower* literally. Becoming a disciple of Jesus is as simple as obeying His call to follow." (From the book "Multiply" by Francis Chan).

There is a difference between a "disciple/follower" and a "believer" We were all called to be disciples of Jesus Christ but many have become only believers. The truth is that we first come to believe in Jesus, from there we should grow to become a disciple and then we are to teach others to become disciples as well. This is the process of disciple making. When Jesus chose the 12, he simply went to them and told them "follow me" from there, each of them left their homes, towns, job, family, etc. then they begin the journey with Christ. How do we become a disciple of Jesus in the year 2023?

To be a disciple of Jesus Christ for this day and age is to imitate him to the point that we will look like him. Not physically of course, but morally and spiritually. Rev. Francis Chan in his book "multiply" wrote "...It's impossible to be a disciple or a follower of someone and not end up like that person..." If we are to be like Jesus, then our lives should reflect his forgiveness, kindness and unconditional love. (con't on pg. 4) 3



Food Pantry News

Your Food Pantry has continued its vital ministry and is seeing a gradual and steady growth in the number of families served. This increase was

expected as people receiving SNAP (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program/Food Stamp) benefits had their monthly amount reduced as of March 1, 2023.

Fortunately, the variety of items available from Feeding America has increased. On our mid-March visit to Feeding America we were able to receive 100 lbs. of fresh potatoes and 20 lbs. of lettuce (10 lbs. of shredded and washed iceberg and 10 lbs. of trimmed and washed green leaf). Although the lettuce came in 5 lb. bags, we re-bagged it in 1-gal. bags for distribution to our customers. As well, we got several cases of elbow macaroni and a case of brown rice to have in reserve for the coming weeks. In total, we got 551 lbs. of food from Feeding America for \$72.69 (some items were free). This was a good month for purchasing from Feeding America. We got 90 lbs. of "shelf-stable product", a variety of goods from Hamburger Helper to boxed cereals to canned vegetables to granola bars and snacks. These were 3 large boxes of items often donated by Kroger Food from their surplus or soon to be outdated items.

Your donations of food and cash are a double blessing. As you donate items listed on the "wish list" at the end of each month's article, we can replenish the shelves of the most popularly requested items. Your cash gifts allow us to purchase items locally each week after we have served our families on Wednesdays. We comparison shop at Piggly Wiggly, Aldi's, Dollar Tree, and Walmart, seeking the best values on items we need. We also buy in quantity when items such as sugar, Hamburger Helper, peanut butter, etc., are on sale so we have these items in reserve to replenish our shelves.

TOWN HALL MEETING Disaffiliation Update

Our special Town Hall meeting was held in the Fellowship Hall after church service on March 5th. It was well attended by our congregants. This was a time for the Council and the pastor to communicate with the congregation what has been happening with the process of disaffiliation. Pastor explained that he missed three deadlines starting in December to January and because of that, the process stopped. This means that we are no longer able to vote to disaffiliate under the paragraph 2553 which would allow us to disaffiliate from the United Methodist Church and keep all of the properties belonging to the church; because of disagreements in regard to the view on human sexuality.

Going forward, the church will remain the same way it is right now. There is a General Conference meeting planned for August 2024 in which there will be the possibility of voting to change the language of the Book of Discipline. General Conferences are a 2-week long meeting of the United Methodist Church denomination with representatives from all over the world. There are more than 800 UMC delegates, that during this period of time, they vote on matters of the denomination. This is the only time and way to make changes to the Book of Discipline. These meetings are normally done every 4 years, but because of the Covid-19 pandemic in 2020, the meeting has been postponed 3 times and now is scheduled for 2024.

Bottom Line: There will be no changes for Delavan UMC. Delavan UMC will continue to be affiliated to the United Methodist Church and will continue to work for God in this community. We will continue to provide spiritual food for those that are spiritually hungry and will continue the ministries of the food pantry and homeless shelter.
