



In The Parable of the Talents (Matthew 25: 14-23), Jesus reports that the master commends the servant for his wise investment saying, "His

master replied, 'Well done, good and faithful servant! You have been faithful with a few things; I will put you in charge of many things. Come and share your master's happiness!"" (NIV)

Your food pantry has done well with the investment that you and all of our supporters with the investment of food and finances with which you have entrusted it. Reviewing the month of December 2023, here are the number of individuals and families that the pantry helped:

- Total individuals helped in December: 224
  - o 108 who came once in December
  - o 116 who came more than once
- Total families helped in December: 78
  - o 39 who came once in December
  - o 39 who came more than once
- 17 new families came in December.

Your pantry was open 51 Wednesdays in 2023 and closed one Wednesday in February because of treacherous weather. In those 51 weeks, the pantry helped feed 2,714 individuals. Those individuals came in various forms. Some were retired, trying to get by on Social Security, some were in a blended family of 8 created by illness and deaths, and some were households that were pooling their resources to make their limited income go farther.

In December 2023, we were able to provide 34 complete ham dinners to our families for Christmas. The last 2 hams went to families who had just lost their jobs because their employers closed business in our area.

It was your love, compassion, and commitment that improved the well-being of all these persons by putting the love of Christ into action among those in need in our community. (con't on pg. 5)

#### FOOD PANTRY (con't)

We have invested in the greatest resource in our community: its people. We have ensured improved health through better and more adequate nutrition. We have helped children focus on their lessons in school rather than on the hunger in their bellies. We (you and the pantry volunteers) each week have provided a welcoming and non-judgmental love in action and acceptance of those who have food needs. We have been faithful with a few things, and we trust that God will continue to enable us in the good we are doing in God's name.

We look forward to 2024 and the opportunity to continue our ministry to those with food needs in our community. We are grateful for our volunteers who faithfully shop, sort, and stock the food we provide to our families. While we are open each Wednesday from 9-noon, there are many hours of preparation and planning each week that are necessary for each Wednesday operation to flow smoothly. We, as a team of volunteers and supporters, are invited to share our Master's happiness as we live out his love and compassion. Thank you and God bless you.

## Delavan United Women in Faith Happenings January 2024

Winter is a good time to start the 2024 United Women in Faith Reading Program which encourages mission, spiritual growth and social action for women, youth & children through the life stories of those writing the books. Copies of the Reading Program for 2023, 2024 and 2021-22 are on the UWFaith Library Cart in the Fellowship Hall. Previous reading programs may be found under Resources at our website: uwfaith.org. You may read books from the last 5 years, starting with the 2018 program year to now. There are 5 categories to read from: Spiritual Growth, Social Action, Leadership Development, Education for Mission and Nurturing for Community.

A new virtual page at: bookshop.org/shop/uwfaith is available to purchase most of the 2024 books. Books are on the cart, most are available through your local library and many are available online. New books available on the cart are: Braiding Sweetgrass, Spiritual Growth 2024 and The Book Woman from Troublesome Creek, Education for Mission 2023. The goal is to read a book from each category to receive an award for Plan I. Bonus books are available and count for 2 books if used for a discussion. Alternate options include watching listed mission movies, listening to Voices from the Field and Faith Talks on uwfaith.org or online live by registration through the website with the national office. Each of these counts for 1 book. A program form is available on the cart to fill out for all books read. It may be handed into the church office or UWF mail slot by Sept. I to receive credit for books read/movies and videos watched. All plans include regular reading of the Response magazine. A full description of the program is available in the Nov-Dec 23' Response magazine and a reprint will be on the cart. National virtual discussions of books are available quarterly with Emily Jones, Reading Coordinator by registration and with Gail Burgess, SE District Program Resources. Her schedule is available upon request to Hb53104@aol.com.

Reading Program Plans available: Plan I: Read 5 books, 1 from each category each year; Plan II: Read 10 books, 2 from each category each year; Plan III: Read 15 books, 2 from each category and 5 from any category each year; Plan IV: Read 20 books, 2 from each category and 10 from any category each year.

The next meeting of the Delavan UWF will be Thursday, February 8 at 10:00 a.m. in the church Library. The program will be the Mission u study on the Lord's Prayer. Look for some new things to learn. Please let us know if you would like to join or have any questions.
