

Last month I wrote about the 4 things that are necessary to have a successful food pantry. I focused on volunteers and their vital role in making the food pantry

successful. This month, I want to focus on having a convenient location. Delavan UMC was blessed when the Phoenix brothers founded Delavan, seeking to build a temperance colony, and did a general layout for the city. Several locations around Phoenix Park were designated at church sites: Methodist, Congregational, Episcopal, and Baptist. Through this vision Delavan UMC sits in a prime location to be of service to the community.

The signs on the corner of 2nd and Washington that advertise the Food Pantry have been an important tool to help the hungry find a place that will provide them with food. Several of our customers, and many persons in helping professions (doctors, nurses, teachers, social workers, etc.) know of our pantry because of the signs and their location. Our location benefits many of our walk-in customers who bring a cart, wagon, or backpack in which to take home their food. Being situated in a residential area and not far from several apartment buildings makes it convenient for those who cannot get a ride or don't have a car.

Although many years ago when the church expanded and additional space was added to the church, it's unlikely that anyone was thinking of a food pantry and food distribution when the driveway was built around the east side of the building to connect to the north and south parking lots. That design feature has proved a blessing to the pantry. It allow cars to queue up in an orderly fashion and for customers to get a numbered shopping list to complete as they wait their turn. In addition, walk-up customers can sit on the steps in pleasant weather and complete their shopping list, or in inclement weather come inside and wait in the chapel. As well, our long corridor allows placement of an 8' "Free Choice" table where we have bread items, produce, etc. to choose as their order is being filled. (con't on pg. 12)

Pastor Angel's Page From Ordinary to Extraordinary 1 Corinthians 1:26-29

Remember, dear brothers and sisters, that few of you were wise in the world's eyes or powerful or wealthy when God called you. ²⁷ Instead, God chose things the world considers foolish in order to shame those who think they are wise. And he chose things that are powerless to shame those who are powerful. ²⁸ God chose things despised by the world, things counted as nothing at all, and used them to bring to nothing what the world considers important. ²⁹ As a result, no one can ever boast in the presence of God.

God has a purpose with you, God made a plan and you are included in that plan. It doesn't matter what had happened in the past, it doesn't matter how many mistakes you have made; all is part of God's plan.

Think about this for a minute, if we need salvation it's because God knew that we were going to make mistakes and bad choices that would separate us from him. But your mistakes and choices would not change God's plan for your life.

God has always called people to work for him, people that are willing to be used by him, people that obey him at all cost. God is looking for people just like you and me to do this job. You might say: "but I am nobody", "I don't know anything" "I am the least qualified" "I don't know how to do it" "I am good where I am" "I'm too old" These are lies the enemy inserts in our mind to keep us from doing God's will.

Some people often believe they can't speak the word of God, or they can't preach, or they can't teach, or they can't be used by God because they are not good enough, they are not prepared enough, they are not well educated, they're not qualified enough. I have good news for you. You don't need to be an expert in the Bible, you don't need seminary or something similar, you don't need to be educated in order to be used by God. You don't NEED any of that! God will use you how he wants to just the way you are. All he needs is someone with a willing heart that will obey him in everything he says. GOD USES ORDINARY PEOPLE TO DO EXTRAORDINARY TASKS. Would you be willing?

Delavan UWF Happenings October 2024

Thank you to all who donated baked items for the recent bake sale Sept. 20-21 during the rummage sale. Thank you to Chris Anding and Tammy Demet who chaired it and all who helped them. It was a success – we made over \$600. They loved all our baked goods and came back for more. Thank you to those who greeted, ushered, lectured and made food for coffee hour for UWF Sunday, Sept. 8. We had Lisa Jones as our speaker during our worship service and received many positive comments. Gail Thompson, our former church Treasurer, received the special Mission Recognition pin.

We will be having our last meeting of the year on Thurs. Nov. 21 at 10 a.m. in the Fellowship Hall. A brief program of Thanksgiving will be planned and our World Thank Offering will be collected.

Following are questions from our October program about the sacredness of the land upon which we plant our crops and food sources: How can farming be a form of church? Can farming/gardening be a form of church? If so, how? If not, why not? Read Acts 2: 42-45. What makes a church a church? What creates our spiritual connectedness to one another? How does growing food allow us to interact with the land and with each other that challenges our notions of what it means to be inhabitants of the earth and spiritual caregivers to one another?

Those are questions to think about. One person made the argument that the church of the future will be on farms. Her explanation was that the experience of farming and connection to the land and people is something spiritual. The other person was challenging the notions of the idea of "church" at all. The conversation was a great exploration of basic human needs of sustenance and relationships while also grappling with the ideas of what is larger than us that connects us to all living beings. I lived on a farm for many years and experienced that connectedness to nature. We lived by the beat of nature and its seasons in the Driftless Area. What are your thoughts? See you at the next meeting, Thursday, Nov. 21 at 10 a.m.



In many sources, the author of the hymn "Never Alone" is listed as anonymous, but in several, Ludie Carrington Day Pickett (1867-1953) is credited.
