Pastor Angel's Page "His Favor Still Available"

"The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, for he has anointed me to bring Good News to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim that captives will be

released, that the blind will see, that the oppressed will be set free, <sup>19</sup> and that the **time of the Lord's favor has come.**" Luke 4: 18-19

This scripture is the account of Luke when Jesus went to the synagogue in Nazareth after he successfully rejected the Devil's temptations. He was handed the scroll of the prophet Isaiah. Jesus purposely read only this part to everyone that was there, then he sat down and began to teach that this prophesy was fulfilled in him that very same day. This was the beginning of Jesus' ministry. I believe that here is when the favor of the Lord started but it wasn't just for that time, the favor of the Lord is still available today.

In most of these articles, I write to tell you how things are going in the pantry and how many families we have helped recently. This month, I

want to share a story of how another pantry in the county helped our pantry with an important need.

Cereal, both sweetened and plain, has been expensive and a scarce item to find at a reasonable price. At the July meeting of the Wal/Co Food Pantry Coordinators, we shared this challenge. Jack, the Coordinator of the Emergency Food Pantry in Walworth, said he had more cereal that he could distribute before it was out of date. We arranged to meet Jack at the Bridge Pantry in Elkhorn on Monday mornings when each of us picks up our orders delivered there from Feeding America. Jack brought 3 large boxes filled with a variety of cereal which allowed us to supply our families with a choice of several cereals.

Psalm 107 begins with the following three verses:

O give thanks to the Lord, for he is good, for his steadfast love endures forever.

<sup>2</sup> Let the redeemed of the Lord say so, those he redeemed from trouble <sup>3</sup> and gathered in from the lands, from the east and from the west, from the north and from the south.

We are thankful for the "steadfast love" of God who blesses us in many ways. When there seemed to be no way to find cereal at a reasonable cost, God revealed a way that provided cereal at no cost. Those of you that are old enough to remember the *Red Green Show* that ran on PBS for many years will probably remember Red's signature saying: *We're all in this together.* This is true of our pantry and its mission – we're all in this together.

I loved it, and it was just the right size for me. I don't remember what he paid for it. Our mailbox was situated a quarter mile away on a gravel road; when I got the mail I would stop to peer into the open metal fence post and see the bluebird's nest. I could then turn onto Blaen Cae Rd. (Welsh name), and ride on the blacktop. I could ride to Sam's station a mile away to pick up a loaf of white bread for Mom, and maybe have a nickel left to get a bottle of Pepsi out of the red cooler.

I could ride to different friend's houses; distance didn't matter. Once I rode all alone along Hwy. 73, a couple of miles beyond the town of Randolph to my cousin Jane's home. I guess we didn't worry about this 7 mile ride without a cell phone, water bottle, sunscreen, or helmet – or what would I do if something went wrong. Nothing happened, and I arrived safely at Jane's home that night. Mom and Dad came over for coffee, put the bike in the truck, and we went home.

One time I remember trying to repaint my bike; I did it in the barn, which was a mistake, because flies kept getting stuck on it. Sadly, I don't remember what happened to my trusty little bike. It was probably passed down to my sisters, or some other cousin. I do remember the feeling of flying down the blacktop at full speeed, my blonde hair flying in the wind, and the pleasure of doing this pain free.

Yes, the gravel road is still there – but now it's paved and called Dykstra Road, my family name. The mailbox is now at the end of the farm's driveway. The barn is gone and memories with it.

P.S. On my 60<sup>th</sup> birthday, I received a new retro Schwinn – no gears; it was my first new bike.

"My Very Best Gift"

It didn't come at Christmas – it wasn't wrapped and it wasn't new. It just happened to come one hot summer day when I was 9 or 10. My gift was a used girl's bicycle. We live on a farm with a very old, small house. It didn't have running water and a bathroom – or even electricity in my early years. Dad and Mom had come through the Depression, and my Uncle Rink had mortaged his farm, so Dad could buy this 90-acre farm down the road from Uncle. There were a lot of hand-me-downs, used and re-used objects. Dad and Uncle Rink could repair everything, and Aunt Rena was very adept at making new things out of old, like my brother's teddy bear made from an old fur coat.

I was learning to ride on Cousin Hank's old boy's bike, which was full size. Boy's bikes had a thick metal crossbar down the middle. I lined it up with this old stone wall, climbed on and took off. I had to stand up to reach the pedals and brake, but each time I just had to tip over and fall in order to stop. After many skinned knees and elbows and a bruised bottom from hitting the crossbar, I finally learned to ride. But, invariably, I still had to fall over when stopping.

One day, Dad came home from Friesland after having been to the feed mill with his pick-up. He called me over, and in the back of the pick-up lay this used, blue girl's bike, not quite full size. He had bought it from our minister whose daughter had outgrown it.

Thank you for helping to feed the 30+ families we serve each week. It's your steadfast love and commitment reflecting the love of Christ that makes life better for so many.
