Be not forgetful to entertain strangers: for thereby some have entertained angels unawares. Hebrews 13: 2 KJV

September showed an increase in the families served. While there were 4 weeks in September, we served 147 families, of which 10 came to the pantry for the first time. That's an average of 37 families per week; with a couple weeks in the low 40's for the number of families served.

When we opened at 9 a.m. on Sept. 24, there were 24 guests (total of walk-up and drive-up) in line for food. When we closed at noon, we had served 38 guests. We worked to fill orders without a break. Often the line has a break of 15-20 minutes when we can replenish the shelves from our "overflow pantry," but not this week. I worked handing out clipboards to guests and welcoming first-time guests. In the line of cars there were 3 cars with dogs in them; one I knew and the other two were new to me. These two were a large New Foundland Retriever and the other had a Chow-Chow.

The car with the Chow-Chow had a mom and her young son (about 3 years old) in it. This car was directly behind the car with the New Foundland. Both cars were near the end of the line, and the little boy needed to use the bathroom. The problem was what to do with the Chow while Mom took her son in the church to use the bathroom. I was about to offer a "dog-sit," when the woman with the New Foundland spoke up and said that the Chow could join her dog in the station wagon. Luckily, both dogs were very friendly and enjoyed making a new friend, and Mom could take care of her son, while I continued to collect completed shopping lists.

That morning, we entertained an angel unaware: at least until a special need arose and the response was present. Sometimes, I am so focused on the mission of the food pantry, that I overlook the presence of angels in our midst. Last Wednesday was a time that I became aware of God's support for the pantry in an unusual manner. (con't on pg. 8) 6
